
REVENUE – GENERAL GOVERNMENT TOTAL \$7,383,038



PROPERTY TAX DISTRIBUTION

The tax bill residents receive includes Municipal property tax (for services provided by Lucan Biddulph), County of Middlesex levy, and the Education Levy.

While Lucan Biddulph collects the county and education portion of the property taxes, it does not have influence on these rates, which are set by County Council and the Province of Ontario respectively. The municipality collects and forwards these amounts to the respective agencies.

WHAT IS THE RESIDENTIAL IMPACT?

For the average Lucan Biddulph residential homeowner, municipal taxes will increase by \$34 in 2022.



The 2020 market value assessment update has been postponed again. This means that there will be no assessment growth related to the planned reassessment period and 2022 property assessment will be the same as 2020 values unless there have been changes to specific properties.




GENERAL ITEMS TO HIGHLIGHT

- Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) 2% increase to the salary grid and council remuneration.
- Insurance term is from Sept I to Aug 31. Sept I 2021 increase was 23%. These values were applied to first 8 months of 2022. Assumed a 10% increase for the Sept I 2022 renewal for the remaining 4 months.
- Election related costs of \$20,000 (election year).
- Cyber Security \$8,750 Software and training required.
- Planning & Zoning
 - Consulting & Engineering Fees added \$40,000 for consultant for design standards review
 - Legal Fees increased by \$10,000 to cover potential appeals related to the Official Plan.
- Donations Expense Council to consider request from St. Mary's Hospital Foundation.
- Fire Departments
 - Increase levy to each department by 5% for 2022.
 - Council Discussion: 10% increase has been requested.

PUBLIC WORKS ROADS - HIGHLIGHTS


- Some expense items increased to cover inflation and increase in coverage areas.
- Salary allocations over the categories were reviewed and revised from 2021.
- Tools & Shop Supplies increased to add the purchase of a bush hog mower \$5k.
- Waste Collection Special Pickup includes the try recycling large item clean up day, as well as having the yard waste bins available from spring through the fall at the PW shop.

PARKS & RECREATION HIGHLIGHTS

- Activities at the community centre are dependent on any pandemic restrictions and the construction timeline.
- Increased ice revenue. Ice will be kept in for the whole year.
- No budget for canteen, vending, or bar.
- Swimming pool, summer camps, and the craft show are included in the draft budget.
- Added four year-round student positions.
- Parks Maintenance expenses have increased due to assumption of new park areas and required maintenance as well as increased use of the splash pad.
- Market St Park tree maintenance project \$10,000. Council to discuss to proceed or not.

SUMMARY & NEXT STEPS

- 2% Municipal Tax Rate Increase
- Budget Surplus approx. \$275k Council to discuss which reserve to direct this to.
 Suggest Construction and/or Parks & Recreation.
- Next Steps:
 - Council to consider a motion to accept the proposed 2022 budget as presented/amended OR a motion to defer to a future Council meeting.
 - Final tax rate levy by-law to be presented once the County and School Board tax rates are known.



PUBLIC WORKS WATER SYSTEM

- The Water Budget is self funded by the Water Users
- Proposed increase in water usage rate \$0.053/cubic meter
- Proposed increase in the water capital levy by 2%
- No change in water flat fees.
- 1.5% increase in water costs from Lake Huron pipeline supply
- Budget Surplus \$2,135 transfer to reserves

Average household uses 15 cubic meters/month Avg 3 month water bill up \$3.33



PUBLIC WORKS WATER SYSTEM

Capital Projects for 2022:

- \$250,000 Alice St. Water main
- \$50,000 Booster Station Roof
- \$25,000 Bulk Water System
- \$60,000 Industrial Land Water main extension
- \$30,000 Generator upgrades

PUBLIC WORKS WASTEWATER SYSTEM

- The Wastewater Budget is self funded by the Wastewater Users
- Proposed increase in wastewater usage rate \$0.053/cubic meter
- Proposed increase in wastewater capital levy 2%
- No change in wastewater flat fees
- Budget Surplus \$ 54,185 transfer to reserves

Average household uses 15 cubic meters/month Avg 3 month wastewater bill up \$3.57



PUBLIC WORKS WASTEWATER SYSTEM

- Capital Projects for 2022:
 - \$50,000 Alice St Sewer Replacement
 - \$324,000 Lucan WWTP Upgrades/Expansion
 - \$56,000 Generator Upgrades
 - \$40,000 Lucan Sanitary Master Plan (projects as a result of flow monitoring)
